Dear Parishioners,

For many of us, as we begin Lent, and turn our minds and hearts to repentance and conversion, the biggest obstacle to holiness, healing, becoming spiritually mature, looking more like Jesus, is our unwillingness to forgive.

Forgiveness is everything! Jesus warns us sternly that if we do not forgive, then our heavenly Father will not forgive us (cf. Mt 18:21-35). These are sober, frightening words.

Now, to be clear, forgiveness doesn't mean, "Hey, no big deal." Hardly. Forgiving someone first of all takes into account that wrongdoing has been done, or else there wouldn't be anything to forgive. For-

giveness means, "I release you. I don't wish harm to come to you. I don't want you to get what's coming to you." Furthermore, forgiveness isn't the same as reconciliation. For a number of reasons, it might not be possible in this life to reconcile with those we forgive. That's OK. We can't let that stop us from taking the crucial first step.

A couple practical ideas to make it strike home: first, write down the names of those who have hurt you. Ask the Holy Spirit to remind you of all those who have wronged you, in ways big and small. And then prayerfully read over each name and ask the Father to bless them, even as He has blessed you

despite the hurts you have caused to countless others. Second, write down the name of any you have not yet been able or willing to forgive. Then, in prayer and especially at Mass, as you consume Jesus' Body and Blood – the Jesus who cried from the cross, "Father, forgive them! They don't know what they're doing!" – ask Him to give you the supernatural strength you need to forgive them. Our heart begins to resemble the heart of Jesus when we beg for the grace of forgiveness.

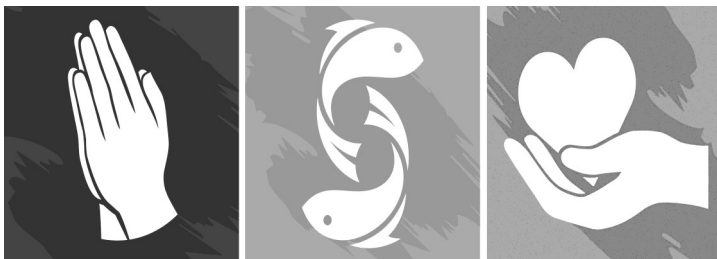

Catholics who have celebrated their 14th birthday are to
abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent
and Good Friday.

In addition to abstaining from meat, Catholics who have
celebrated their 18th birthday, until they celebrated their 59th
birthday, are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
Those who are bound to this regulation may only eat one full
meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to main-
tain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods
between meals is not permitted.

These minimal penitential practices should not be lightly
excused.

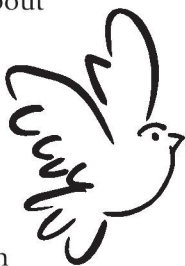
Thoughtful Moments

Better parenting in Lent

Is there a parenting habit you want to get rid of? Jesus came to free prisoners. With his help, work during Lent to let go of a habit you want to shed. Do you nag? Fail to listen? Spent too much time on your screen? If you would like to be a better parent, pick one habit and, one day at a time, work to let it go.

Unconditional forgiveness

Children learn about God's love from us, their parents. Lent is the perfect time to teach forgiveness. Attend a penance service as a family. Invite children to make an examination of conscience. Make it clear that unconditional forgiveness is part of any Catholic home. Seek God's help and the help of the larger community.



"The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness"
(Lamentations 3:22-23).



Five ways to prepare for Easter joy

Lent is an opportunity to strengthen our family's spiritual life. We start by examining where we are and who we want to become as a family.

Recommitment: Resolve to live as a gospel-centered family and recommit to the Ten Commandments. Encourage reverence for God, modesty and respect for others, integrity in work, gratitude, and respect for others' possessions.

Reconciliation: Jesus said we should reconcile with our brother before coming to worship (Matthew 5:23:24). Commit to frequent Confession and make it a family practice to make amends and to repair relationships with anyone wronged.

Worship: Give your family the powerful grace of the Eucharist. Attend Mass together and encourage prayer and

participation from children. Teach them the prayers and the most common hymns sung at your parish.

Cue them when to sit, stand, and kneel. Whisper together, "I love you, Jesus," at the elevation of the Body and Blood.

Togetherness: Shared time is an

opportunity to share values and faith. When parents invest time – like family meals – to share their faith, children understand that

faith is important.

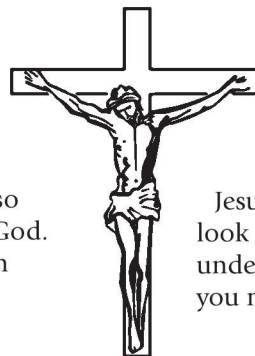

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics have Crucifixes in Church?

A crucifix – a cross with Christ's body on it – represents the ultimate act of love. It's a symbol of the price of our salvation, done so we could be in heaven with God. This sacrifice is renewed in an unbloody manner at Mass



(Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1367). "When you look at the crucifix, you understand how much Jesus loved you then. When you look at the Sacred Host you understand how much Jesus loves you now" (Mother Teresa).

Correction, fraternally

Fraternal correction – or alerting someone to sin and encouraging them to virtue – is part of family life and is essential to forming children in virtue. It must be done carefully, however, to be effective:

Be discrete. If wrong has been done, Jesus said, *“Go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone”* (Matthew 18:15). Try to resolve conflicts at the lowest level. For example, if you have trouble with a relative, solve it with him or her directly and in private, instead of involving others.



Speak the loving truth. People close to us who offend don't always do so with ill intent. Always give the benefit of the doubt, but say what's on your mind. Give your loved one a chance to explain.

Pick your battles. Correcting the sinner is an act of charity. Children may try to push limits, and these are great opportunities to clarify what you value as a family. Choose the battles that must be fought, rather than the battles that can be fought.

Scripture LESSON

John 11:1-45, Generous faith, generous reward

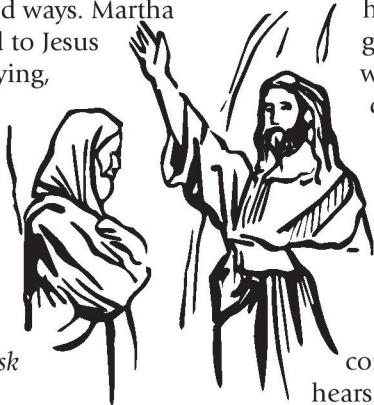
God always answers prayers, sometimes in unexpected ways. Martha and Mary had sent word to Jesus that their brother was dying, believing he could help. They may have been disappointed when he took his time coming to them and Lazarus died. Still, Martha demonstrated great faith: *“Even now I know that whatever you ask of God he will give you.”*

Jesus intentionally delayed so that rather than just heal Lazarus, he gave him new life. Martha didn't know what would happen, but she knew Jesus and she trusted his wisdom. His

response was a marvelous one: for her faith, he worked a great miracle. Martha was right: Jesus cared, he could help, and all things are possible with God.

What can a parent do? Tell children that they can talk to God about anything and that they can trust him completely. He always hears our prayers.

Sometimes God doesn't give us what we want but he always gives us what we need, right when we need it. We can trust that his answer to us will be marvelous, too.



Feasts & Celebrations

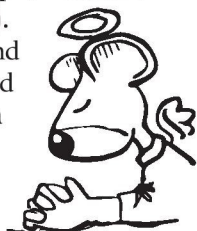
March 6 – St. Colette (1447). St. Colette was born in Corbie, France. She was orphaned at seventeen and gave her inheritance to the poor. She became a Franciscan Tertiary and lived in solitude. God later sent St. Colette to reform the Poor Clares. She founded seventeen convents under the reformed rule.

March 17 – St. Patrick of Ireland (461). Born in Scotland, St. Patrick was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave. He escaped but later returned to become the bishop of Ireland and is

credited for having established the Church there.

March 18 – St. Cyril of Jerusalem (386). Born around 315 and raised in Jerusalem, St. Cyril was ordained a priest and later appointed the Bishop of Jerusalem. He spent half of his office exiled by Arian heretics. He's known for his catechetical lectures.

March 20 – St. Joseph, Husband of Mary (1st century). Jesus' earthly father and husband to the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph is a model of fatherhood and a protector of families.



Parent TALK

Our children were so disruptive during Mass that my husband and I attended separate Masses to avoid bringing them. After a while, I really missed attending Mass as a family. So I asked our pastor for suggestions.

The first thing Fr. Stan said was to sit up front. He said children pay closer attention when they can see what is going on. Then he suggested arriving 15 minutes early to pray a decade of the Rosary together. When children pray in a quiet church, they get the idea that church is for prayer – not play.

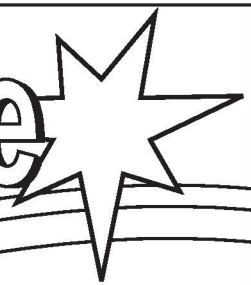
Finally, he said to take the family out for a treat after Mass. Not only is it a reward for good behavior, it helps make Sunday feel special.

His advice worked well. I still have to issue the occasional “shush,” but now we get to attend Mass together. And that's important for all of us.

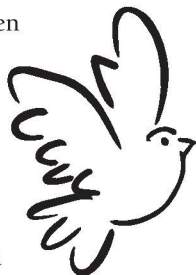
Momentos para pensar

Si quieren ser mejores padres, elijan un hábito y, día a día, esfuércense por eliminarlo.

Perdón incondicional

Los niños aprenden sobre el amor de Dios de nosotros, sus padres. La Cuaresma es el momento perfecto para enseñar perdón. Inviten a sus hijos a que hagan un examen de conciencia. Dejen claro que el perdón incondicional es un componente de todo hogar católico. Busquen la ayuda de Dios y la ayuda de la comunidad más amplia.

Cinco formas de prepararnos para el gozo de la Pascua

La Cuaresma presenta la ocasión de fortalecer la vida espiritual de nuestra familia. Empezamos por examinar dónde estamos y en quiénes queremos convertirnos como familia:

Compromiso renovado:

Propónganse vivir como familia centrada en el evangelio y renueven su compromiso a los Diez Mandamientos.

Estimulen la reverencia a Dios, la modestia y el respeto por los demás, la integridad en el trabajo, la gratitud y el respeto por las pertenencias de los demás.

Reconciliación: Jesús dijo que debemos reconciliarnos con nuestro hermano antes de acudir al culto (Mateo 5:23:24). Propónganse ir a confesar con frecuencia y establezcan en su familia el hábito de hacer las paces y reparar la relación con quienes hayan perjudicado.

Culto: Ofrezcan a su familia la poderosa gracia de la Eucaristía. Vayan juntos a misa

y animen la oración y la participación de sus hijos. Enséñenles las oraciones y los himnos que se cantan con más frecuencia en su parroquia. Indíquenles cuándo deben sentarse, ponerse de pie y arrodillarse. Susurren juntos "Jesús, te amo" en la elevación del Cuerpo y la Sangre.

Unidad: El tiempo compartido es una oportunidad de compartir sus valores y su fe. Cuando los padres invierten tiempo – como las comidas en familia – en compartir su fe, los niños entienden que la fe es importante.

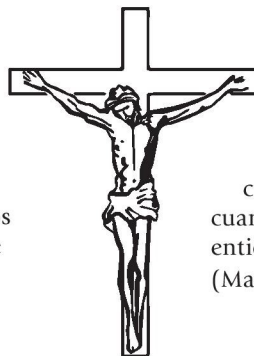

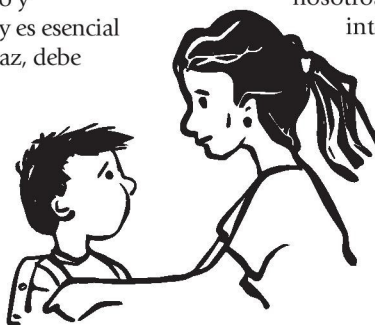
incruenta en la misa (*Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica*, 1545). "Cuando miras al crucifijo, entiendes cuánto te amó Jesús entonces, cuando miras la Sagrada Hostia entiendes cuánto te ama Jesús ahora" (Madre Teresa).

Corrección, fraternalmente

La corrección fraterna – advertir a alguien del pecado y encaminarles a la virtud – es parte de la vida familiar y es esencial para formar a los niños en la virtud. Pero para ser eficaz, debe hacerse con cuidado:

Sean discretos. Si se ha cometido algún mal, dijo Jesús: “Vete a hablar con él a solas para reprochárselo” (Mateo 18:15). Procuren resolver conflictos al nivel más básico. Por ejemplo, si tienen algún problema con un familiar, solúcionenlo con esa persona directamente y en privado, en lugar de involucrar a otras personas.

Digan la verdad cariñosa. La gente cercana a



nosotros que nos ofende no lo hace siempre con mala intención. Concedan siempre el beneficio de la duda, pero digan lo que piensan. Denle a su ser querido la oportunidad de explicarse.

Elijan sus batallas. Corregir al pecador es una obra de caridad. Puede que sus hijos traten de sobrepasar los límites establecidos y esto ofrece espléndidas oportunidades de aclarar lo que ustedes valoran como familia. Elijan las batallas que deben lucharse, en lugar de las batallas que pueden lucharse.

Lecciones de las Escrituras

Juan 11:1-45, Fe generosa, recompensa generosa

Dios siempre atiende las plegarias, a veces de maneras inesperadas. Marta y María habían avisado a Jesús de que su hermano se estaba muriendo, creyendo que él podría ayudar. Quizá se sintieron decepcionadas cuando él se demoró en llegar y Lázaro murió. Sin embargo, Marta demostró su gran fe: “Pero yo sé que aun ahora, Dios te concederá todo lo que le pidas”.

Jesús se retrasó a propósito para darle a Lázaro una vida nueva, en vez de sólo sanarlo. Marta no sabía lo que iba a suceder, pero conocía a Jesús y confiaba en su sabiduría. Su respuesta fue maravillosa:



por la fe de Marta, él obró un gran milagro. Marta llevaba razón: Jesús se ocupaba de ellos, podía ayudar y todo es posible con Dios.

¿Qué pueden hacer los padres? Explíquenles a sus hijos que pueden contarle todo a Dios y que pueden confiar en él por completo. Él siempre escucha nuestras oraciones.

A veces Dios no nos da lo que queremos, pero siempre nos da lo que necesitamos justo cuando lo necesitamos. Podemos confiar en que la respuesta que nos dé será también maravillosa.

Hablan los padres

Durante la misa nuestros hijos eran tan alborotadores que mi esposo y yo íbamos a misas distintas para evitar llevarlos. Al cabo de algún tiempo yo echaba de



menos ir a misa en familia. Así que le pedí sugerencias a nuestro párroco.

Lo primero que dijo el padre Stan es que nos sentáramos delante. Dijo que los niños prestan más

atención cuando pueden ver lo que pasa. Luego nos sugirió que llegáramos con 15 minutos de antelación para rezar juntos una década del rosario. Cuando los niños rezan en una iglesia en silencio, entienden que la iglesia es un lugar para rezar, no para jugar.

Finalmente nos recomendó que después de misa nos concediéramos un capricho en familia. No sólo es una recompensa por buen comportamiento, sino que contribuye a que percibamos el domingo como un día especial.

Su consejo dio buen resultado. Aún tengo que decir “chitón” de vez en cuando, pero ahora podemos asistir a misa en familia. Y eso es importante para todos nosotros.

Fiestas y celebraciones

6 de marzo – Santa Coleta (1447). Santa Coleta nació en Corbie, Francia. Se quedó huérfana a los diecisiete años y entregó su herencia a los pobres. Se hizo franciscana terciaria y vivió en soledad. Más tarde Dios envió a santa Coleta a reformar a las Clarisas Pobres. Fundó diecisiete conventos de la regla reformada.

17 de marzo – San Patricio de Irlanda (461). Nacido en Escocia, san Patricio fue raptado y llevado a Irlanda como esclavo. Escapó de su cautiverio pero regresó más tarde para convertirse en obispo de Irlanda y se le atribuye el establecimiento de la

iglesia en este país.

18 de marzo – San Cirilo de Jerusalén (386). Nacido alrededor del 315 y criado en Jerusalén, san Cirilo fue ordenado sacerdote y más tarde nombrado obispo de Jerusalén. Pasó la mitad de su ministerio en exilio al que fue enviado por los herejes arrianos. Es conocido por sus lecturas catequéticas.

20 de marzo – San José, esposo de María (siglo I). Padre terrenal de Jesús y esposo de la Bendita Madre, san José es modelo para los padres y protector de las familias.
