MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS, HAVE MERCY ON US!

The month of June is dedicated to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Pope Francis, in his 2013 homily on the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, said, "It is more difficult to let God love us than to love Him! The best way to love Him in return is to open our hearts and let Him love us."

In Catholic churches, one of the most popular images of Jesus is the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. It is the image of God's love revealed in the pierced heart of His Son, a symbol of a love that conquers sin and surpasses death.

Jesus gave himself on the cross so that we, can experience the love of God more fully. The heart on statues of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is exposed to show us that He is giving His heart to us, and it burns with His love for us.

This month we are reminded to open ourselves to the love of Christ and to give ourselves completely to Him. He lays His heart open before us as an example of how to live our lives. God is love and it is through our love for each other that we come to know God and serve Him. No one has ever seen God it is through faith that we believe. If we love one another, God remains in us, and His love is brought to perfection in us. We are given a simple rule, to love others as God loves us. By following this commandment, we remain one with God. This is the message of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Jesus gave us the ultimate example of love, by laying down His life for us and setting His heart upon us.

God made us for Himself and drew us to Himself. The will of God is that not one of his sheep is lost. The Sacred Heart of Jesus is a human heart filled with divine love which is poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit.

The wounded Heart of Jesus, Heals us. There is hope for every soul to be transformed by Love. We must humbly turn to His heart, seek forgiveness and learn to forgive others. Don't let the past hurts fill your hearts, let yourselves be free to love Christ as He loves you. Receive His Love and Healing. In His Humanity He suffered, He felt pain, He laid down His life and set His heart upon us. It is His desire that we use the example God has given to us and share it with the world.

The Lord Jesus gave 12 promises to St. Margaret Mary for those who persevere in devotion to His Sacred Heart. This devotion is our recognition of the long-suffering love and compassion of Jesus towards humanity. He promises

1. I will give them all the graces necessary for their state in life.
2. I will give peace to their families.
3. I will console them in all their troubles.
4. They shall find in My Heart an assured refuge during life and especially at the hour of death.
5. I will pour abundant blessings on all their undertakings.
6. Sinners shall find in My Heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy.
7. Tepid souls shall become fervent.
8. Fervent souls shall speedily rise to great perfection.
9. I will bless the homes in which the image of My Sacred Heart shall be exposed and honored.
10. I will give priests the power to touch the most hardened hearts.
11. Those who propagate this devotion shall have their name written in My Heart, and it shall never be effaced.
12. The all-powerful love of My Heart will grant to all those who shall receive Communion on the First Friday of nine consecutive months the grace of final repentance; they shall not die under My displeasure, nor without receiving their Sacraments; My Heart shall be their assured refuge at the last hour.

The purpose of our devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is to focus our hearts on receiving and returning His love with gratitude, with all of our heart, soul, and strength that He may be glorified. This and every month I pray that we open our hearts and share Christ's love.

THE FEASTS OF SAINTS PETER & PAUL - JUNE 29TH.

Most of the apostles and lots of saints have their own feast day, but how about the two most famous saints of the early church? There is February 22nd in which the Church celebrates the “Chair of Peter” the sign that Peter was the first among the apostles and the one designated to lead the early Church after Jesus’ Resurrection and Ascension. The painting by Paul Rubens shows Peter with the “Keys” and wearing the *pallium* of the office of Bishop. But there is no “Feast of St. Peter.”

St. Paul, although not one of the Twelve, was an Apostle commissioned by Jesus. There is the January 25th celebration of “The Conversion of St. Paul” which commemorates the Damascus Road episode described in Acts of the Apostles: 9:1-31, 22:1-22, and 26:9-24. It is the scene made famous by the “Conversion on the Way to Damascus” painting by Caravaggio. But there is no “Feast of St. Paul.”

The two leading saints of the early Church are celebrated together in the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul, (or the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul if celebrated on a Sunday). This celebration is a liturgical feast in honor of the martyrdom in Rome of the apostles Saint Peter and Saint Paul and is observed on June 29th.

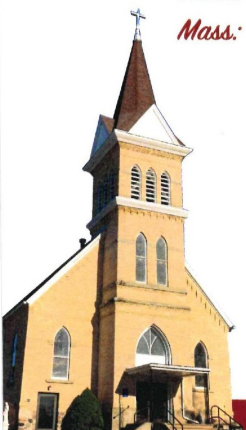

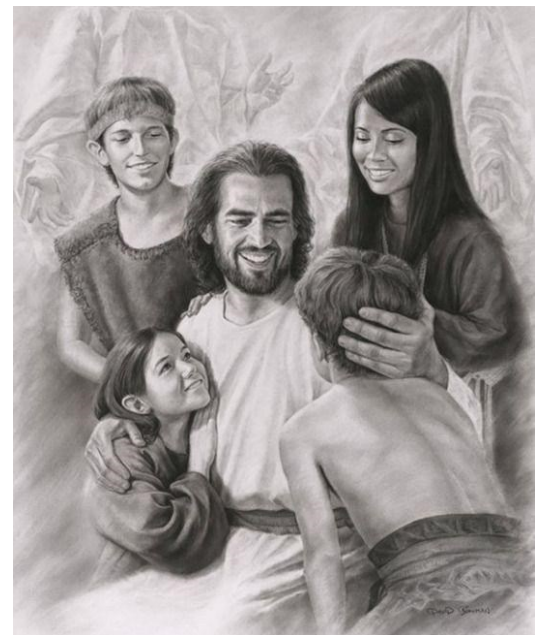

Who: It is Catholic, but we encourage youth of all faiths or no faith to attend. (Please bring friends! This is a great way to help others experience God’s love!).

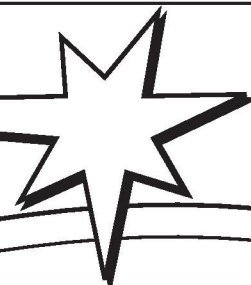

St. Anthony of Padua

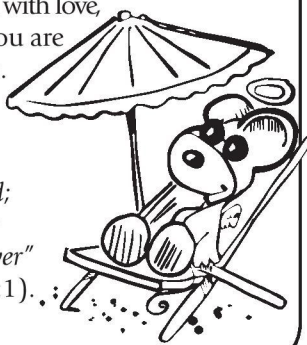
Born Fernando de Bulhom in Lisbon, Portugal, in 1195, St. Anthony was originally an Augustinian monk. He was inspired to join the Franciscans after hearing the news of five martyred Franciscans, taking the name "Anthony." At a meeting of the Dominican and Franciscan Orders, St. Anthony was spontaneously asked to preach a sermon and inspired everyone with his knowledge of the divine. He is known for working miracles and receiving a vision of the Christ Child.



Open your eyes

Let them inspire and protect your family as you enjoy your warm-weather pursuits. Seek their intercession for your family's well-being.

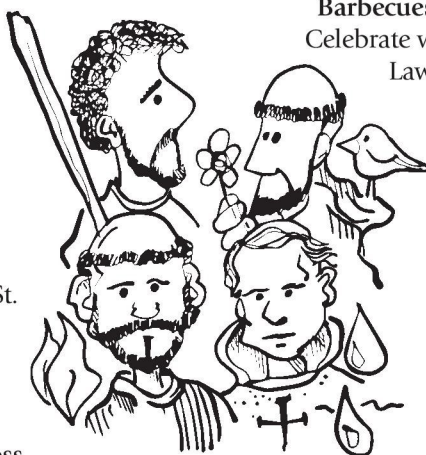
Traveling adventures: Invoke St. Christopher, the patron of travelers, who according to legend safely carried the Christ Child across a river. For air-bound journeys, turn to St. Joseph of Cupertino. Celebrated for his humility and piety, he is said to have levitated due to spiritual ecstasy.

Outdoor activities: Immerse yourself in the natural world with St. Francis of Assisi. His love for all creation shines through in his "Canticle of the Sun."

Patron of animals, he famously brokered peace between a menacing wolf and a terrified town.

Barbecues and campfires: Celebrate with the spirit of St. Lawrence, a third-century Roman deacon who humorously faced martyrdom. As he was roasted alive, he remarked, "I am well done. Turn me over." His courage and wit make him a fitting patron for grill enthusiasts.

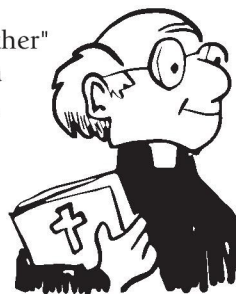
Water fun: When swimming or sailing, remember St. Adjutor of Vernon, the patron saint of swimmers, who swam to freedom to avoid capture. Or, set sail with St. Brendan the Navigator, a fifth-century Irish abbot renowned for his reported journey to the "Promised Land of the Saints" and his safe return.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Referring to priests as "Father" signifies that we belong to a spiritual family guided by a father figure. This honorific was given to leaders of the early Church. "Even if you should have countless guides to Christ, yet you do not have

many fathers, for I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel" (1 Corinthians 4:15). As a father guides, nurtures, instructs, and cares for his children, so a priest does the same for his parish family.

Bring God's grace into your home

In a world that can feel hostile, tapping into the profound mercy of the Father can transform our lives and bring us peace. Here's how to bring God's grace into your home with five simple practices:

Choose kindness: Outlaw sarcasm, ridicule, and cutting remarks. Demonstrate that a gentle word and an open heart reflect the Father's merciful love.

Pray for those who challenge you: This isn't about changing them — it's about softening your own heart so you can learn to love even those difficult to like.



Take the smallest portion: When sharing a treat, choose the smallest piece for yourself, mirroring the Father's generosity. *"He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us"* (Romans 8:32).

Gift the gift of yourself: Setting aside your screen to offer your undivided attention can be a revolutionary act of love.

Forgive freely and quickly: We imitate God's mercy when we forgive. It frees us to find peace. Reconciliation isn't always possible (or wise), but forgiveness always is.

Scripture LESSON

Mark 5:21-43, Rewards of faith

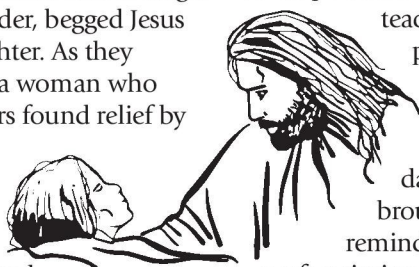
In this passage, Jesus encountered two remarkable displays of faith and courage. Jairus, a synagogue leader, begged Jesus to heal his dying daughter. As they travelled to his home, a woman who suffered for twelve years found relief by touching Jesus' cloak.

These readings teach us several important lessons: First, faith is powerful. Both Jairus and the suffering woman were convinced of Jesus' ability to heal, showing us the importance of trust in God's power. Second, compassion matters. Jesus stopped to heal the woman, showing kindness even amidst the urgency of His errand. Third, miracles happen through

prayer. Fourth, perseverance is key.

Jairus persisted in seeking Jesus, teaching us to persevere in prayer and trust in God's timing. Lastly, trust God's plan. Though Jairus' daughter died, Jesus brought her back to life, reminding us to trust in God's perfect timing and plan for our lives.

What can a parent do? Encourage children to pray boldly, trusting that God hears and answers. These accounts inspire us to have unwavering faith, show compassion, pray fervently, persevere, and trust in God's ultimate goodness.



Feasts & Celebrations

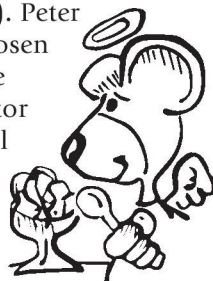
June 5 - St. Boniface (754). The "Apostle of Germany," St. Boniface was a monk dedicated to spreading the Gospel in Germany. He converted many to Christianity and restored dioceses in Bavaria, Thuringia, and Franconia.

June 7 - Solemnity of the Sacred Heart (1765). At the end of the seventeenth century, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque began receiving visions of Jesus, who urged her to spread public devotion to the Sacred Heart. The image of Jesus' heart, pierced and enthroned in unquenchable flames reminds us of His

intense and eternal love for us.

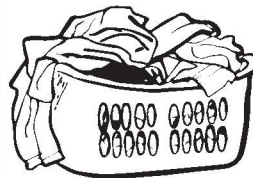
June 27 - St. Cyril of Alexandria (444). St. Cyril was a bishop of Alexandria and a Doctor of the Church. He vigorously defended the doctrine of Christ's two natures against the heretic Nestorius at the Council of Ephesus (431).

June 29 - SS. Peter and Paul (1st Century). Peter was the apostle chosen by Jesus to lead the Church. A persecutor of the Church, Paul became the Great Apostle, also transformed by grace.

San Antonio de Padua

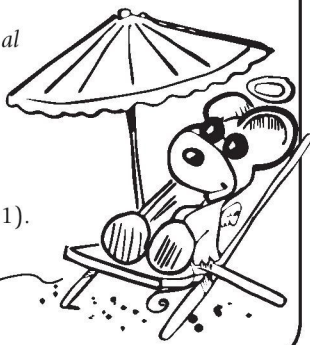

Durante un encuentro de dominicos y franciscanos, se le pidió que predicara un sermón e inspiró a todos con su conocimiento de lo divino. Se le conoce por sus milagros y por haber tenido una visión de Cristo Niño.



Abran los ojos

Los padres saben que sus hijos prosperan cuando se sienten amados. Sin embargo, Dios sabe que esta necesidad de amor no cesa cuando crecemos. Celebren el verano con los santos

Acojan a la Comunión de los Santos incorporando a los santos en sus actividades veraniegas y dedicando cada aventura a un santo. Que ellos los inspiren y que protejan a su familia mientras disfrutan de sus ocupaciones en los meses cálidos. Busquen su intercesión para el bienestar de su familia.

Viajes: Invoquen a san Cristóbal, patrón de los viajeros, quien según la leyenda transportó a Cristo Niño a través de un río. Cuando viajen por avión, diríjanse a san José de Cupertino. Celebrado por su humildad y piedad, se dice que levitaba debido a su éxtasis espiritual.

Actividades al aire libre: Sumérjanse en el mundo natural con san Francisco de Asís. Su amor por todas las criaturas brilla en su "Cántico del hermano Sol". Patrón de los

animales, es célebre por haber negociado la paz entre un feroz lobo y una aterrorizada ciudad.

Barbacoas y fuegos de campamento: Celebren con el espíritu de san

Lorenzo, un diácono romano del siglo III que hizo frente a la muerte con humor. Al ser quemado vivo, dijo: "Estoy asado. Dame la vuelta". Su valor e ingenio lo hacen el patrón perfecto para los aficionados a las parrilladas.

Diversiones en el agua: Cuando naden o naveguen, recuerden a san

Adjutor de Vernon, patrón de los nadadores, que escapó nadando para evitar el cautiverio. O naveguen con San Brendan el Navegante, un abad irlandés del siglo V famoso por la historia de su viaje a la "Tierra de Promisión de los Santos" del que regresó sano y salvo.



¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos?

¿Por qué llaman los católicos "padre" al sacerdote?

Al referirnos a los sacerdotes como "padre" indicamos que pertenecemos a una familia espiritual dirigida por una figura paterna. Este título honorífico se le dio a los dirigentes de la Iglesia primitiva. "Porque, aunque tengan diez mil preceptores en Cristo, no tienen muchos



padres: soy yo el que los ha engendrado en Cristo Jesús, mediante la predicación de la Buena Noticia" (1 Corintios 4:15). Tal como un padre guía, nutre, instruye y se ocupa de sus hijos, así también un sacerdote hace lo mismo por la familia de su parroquia.

Lleven la gracia de Dios a su hogar

En un mundo que puede parecernos hostil, aprovechar la profunda misericordia del Padre puede transformar nuestras vidas y darnos paz. He aquí cómo llevar la gracia de Dios a su hogar con cinco sencillas prácticas:

Elijan la amabilidad: Destierren el sarcasmo, el ridículo y las observaciones hirientes. Demuestren que una palabra amable y un corazón abierto reflejan el amor misericordioso del Padre.

Recen por los que los retan: No se trata de cambiarlos sino de enternecer su corazón para que puedan aprender a amar incluso a personas que no les gustan.



Tomen la porción más pequeña: Cuando compartan una golosina, elijan la porción más pequeña para ustedes, reflejando la generosidad del Padre. *“El que no escatimó a su propio Hijo, sino que lo entregó por todos nosotros”* (Romanos 8:32).

Regalen el don de ustedes mismos: Dejar a un lado su pantalla para prestar toda su atención a alguien puede ser un acto revolucionario de amor.

Perdonen con generosidad y rapidez: Imitamos la misericordia de Dios cuando perdonamos. Nos libera para encontrar la paz. La reconciliación no siempre es posible (o prudente), pero el perdón siempre lo es.

Lecciones de las Escrituras

Marcos 5:21-43, Recompensas de la fe

En este pasaje, Jesús se encuentra con dos notables demostraciones de fe y curación. Jairo, un líder de la sinagoga, suplicó a Jesús que sanara a su hija moribunda. De camino a su casa, una mujer enferma durante doce años encontró alivio al tocar el manto de Jesús.

Estas lecturas nos enseñan varias lecciones importantes: Primero, la fe es poderosa. Tanto Jairo como la mujer doliente estaban convencidos de la habilidad de Jesús para sanar, demostrándonos la importancia de la confianza en el poder de Dios. En segundo lugar, la compasión importa. Jesús se detuvo para curar a la mujer, mostrando su bondad a pesar de la urgencia de su mandato. En tercer lugar los milagros

suceden mediante la oración. En cuarto lugar, la perseverancia es fundamental.

Jairo insistió en buscar a Jesús, enseñándonos a perseverar en la oración y a confiar en el ritmo de Dios. Finalmente, confíen en el plan de Dios. Aunque la hija de Jairo murió, Jesús la devolvió a la vida, recordándonos que confiemos en el ritmo y el plan de Dios para nuestras vidas.

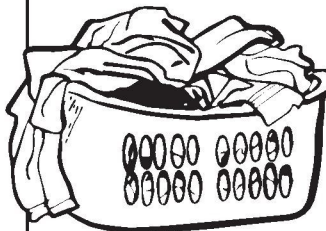
¿Qué pueden hacer los padres? Animen a sus hijos a que recen con valentía, confiando en que Dios los escucha y contesta. Estos relatos nos inspiran a tener fe inquebrantable, a mostrar compasión, a rezar con fervor, a perseverar y a confiar en la bondad infinita de Dios.



Hablan los padres

No aprendí a lavar la ropa hasta que fui a la universidad. Decidida a que mis hijos fueran más autosuficientes, les di clases de “Lavado de ropa 101” cuando eran pequeños. Ben aprendió inmediatamente, pero a Noah le costaba más.

Tras meses de insistirle para que lavara su ropa cada semana, decidí dejar que Noah experimentara las consecuencias de sus decisiones.



Dejé de insistir y cerré los ojos (y la nariz). La ropa sucia se amontonaba. Empezó a oler mal. A Noah se le terminaba la ropa y reciclaba lo del cesto de la ropa sucia. Una semana. Dos semanas. Tres semanas. Sus compañeros en la escuela empezaron a darse cuenta.

Finalmente, ni él podía soportarlo y pidió ayuda. Juntos separamos la ropa en montones por colores y él la lavó. Reorganizamos sus cajones y su armario para que fuera más fácil colocar la ropa. Ahora le gusta su independencia y (por lo general) está al tanto del lavado.

Fiestas y celebraciones

5 de junio – San Bonifacio (754). El “Apóstol de Alemania”, San Bonifacio fue un monje dedicado a predicar el evangelio en Alemania. Convirtió a muchos al cristianismo y restauró diócesis en Baviera, Turingia y Franconia.

7 de junio – Solemnidad del Sagrado Corazón (1765). Al final del siglo XVIII, santa Margarita María Alacoque empezó a recibir visiones de Jesús, que le pedía que difundiera la devoción al Sagrado Corazón. La imagen del corazón de Jesús atravesado y rodeado de llamas inextinguibles nos recuerda su amor

intenso y eterno por nosotros.

27 de junio – San Cirilo de Alejandría (444). San Cirilo era obispo de Alejandría y doctor de la Iglesia. Defendió vigorosamente la doctrina de las dos naturalezas de Cristo contra el hereje Nestorio en el concilio de Éfeso (431).

29 de junio – San Pedro y san Pablo (siglo I). Pedro fue el apóstol elegido por Jesús para dirigir la Iglesia. Perseguidor de la Iglesia, Pablo se convirtió en “el Apóstol”, transformado por la gracia.



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
